


Woodland HERITAGE TRAIL



Look to the Sky

If you keep your eyes peeled, you may spot the birds described below while you walk the Woodland Heritage Trail.

Red-tailed hawks (*Buteo jamaicensis*) can be found in this area year round. They have broad, round wings and short, wide tails. You will often find them perched on fence posts or telephone poles lining fields or roads.

The yellow warbler (*Dendroica petechia*) is an exceptionally bright spot of colour. It is a small songbird with a medium-length tail and rounded head. These birds eat insects and their straight, thin bills are relatively large.

The most common and smallest species of woodpecker locally is the downy woodpecker (*Picoides pubescens*). Their colouring is checkered black and white, and males have a small red patch on the back of their heads. Listen for their pecking sound and see if you can glimpse holes they made in the trees.


